FROM THE CHAIR

The Value of Your Commitment

In my position as Chair of The Fellows this year, I have developed a special appreciation for the value of the research of the American Bar Foundation and the importance of the Fellows to the success of its extraordinary program. The research of the ABF has gained an unprecedented level of respect and prominence in the legal and academic

communities, and the contribution of the Fellows has played no small part in the achievement of the reputation it now enjoys.

The Fellows, at almost 7,000 strong, consisting of the top one-third of one percent of all the lawyers in the United States, are probably the most important group of contributors to legal research in the world, certainly in this country. I hope all of you will reflect on the work that the Foundation has done, largely through the efforts of The Fellows, to improve not only the profession, but also those of us who are affected by the law. It is this idealistic commitment you have made, which is in itself unique, that has provided unique results benefiting people in a very permanent way. In addition to the knowledge you have regarding the value of your commitment, we have taken steps to provide The Fellows with additional ways to benefit from the commitment they have made to the Foundation. Two recent initiatives, The Fellows Network Referral Program and the People to People Ambassador Program, are two of our newest membership benefits. These are discussed below.

Fellows Network Referral Program

One of our newest member benefits is the creation of an opportunity to communicate with each of The Fellows through access to the complete contact database of The Fellows. Through this program, each Fellow will have the opportunity to access the entire Fellows database in terms of contact information, and will be given a special passcode for that access. Once on that database, you will be able to obtain all contact information for each Fellow in every state, and, in addition, the specialty, area of practice or area of interest, of each of The Fellows. This will be a valuable

tool for potential referral among The Fellows. You will be able to search and sort by name, location, or specialty (or a combination of those) for any Fellow you may wish to contact for professional or social reasons. Since the Fellows are limited to the top one-third of one percent of all lawyers in the United States, one is assured that the person who is on the contact list has received special recognition for ethics and professional excellence by his or her peers. The website will not provide biographical sketches of each Fellow of the kind provided by Martindale Hubbell or other similar directories; however, it will provide all Fellows with immediate contact information for other Fellows in areas and specialties of interest, something no other directory can do. Once a person is located on our website it would then be appropriate, if desired, to contact those other directories for further biographical sketches. We expect to be on line no later than July 1 of this year. We believe this program will be financially remunerative to The Fellows since it will build a unique database of highly competent and reputable individuals who also are willing to make a commitment to the profession by being a Fellow. We wish to thank Mark Granfors, in the Technical Services Department of the Foundation, as well as Baimei Guo, The Fellows Database and Web Manager, for the work in developing this program for our website.

New Travel Opportunities through The Fellows – Come to Russia With Us in 2005

Another new member benefit is the opportunity to participate in an annual cultural and professional delegation that will be led by one or more of the officers of The Fellows in conjunction with the People to People Ambassador Program. The People to People Ambassador Program was created at the suggestion and with the help of President Eisenhower in 1956, and since that time has become one of the most reliable and enjoyable travel providers available. Richard Pena, a Director of the American Bar Foundation and Secretary of The Fellows, has led six delegations in recent years, including delegations to China, South Africa, Cuba, and most recently Viet Nam. Through that relationship, Richard, who also serves on the Advisory Council of the People to People Ambassador Program, suggested the development of a formal

relationship between The Fellows and the People to People Program. From that suggestion, we have concluded an agreement, whereby I will lead a delegation of Fellows to Russia in late April, 2005. On that trip we will travel to Moscow, Novgorod, and St. Petersburg. I first traveled to the Soviet Union in 1964, during the Khrushchev era, to study Russian, and ultimately received a degree in Russian. I have returned to Russia many times since then, for professional and educational purposes. I can promise that you will find this an enjoyable and extremely interesting tour, and that your participation will help contribute to a greater understanding of our respective judicial and legal systems and will also afford you the opportunity to build future professional and personal relationships. Spouses, of course, as well as guests, are welcome, and you will be receiving a more detailed letter from me shortly formally inviting you to join us on this new delegation. We are optimistic that our relationship with the People to People Ambassador Program will continue to expand such that The Fellows can plan annually for at least one trip, with other Fellows and their families, on a People to People Ambassador Program.

Time of Transition

After 14 years of exceptional service as Director of the American Bar Foundation, Bryant Garth will be stepping down from that position in September. Although he will be leaving the position as Director, he will continue as a Senior Research Fellow with the Foundation. Through his leadership as Director, he has been the primary factor in bringing together the most thoughtful, creative, and sophisticated legal minds in the entire history of the Foundation, and as a result has furthered the reputation of the Foundation to the extent it is now globally recognized as a preeminent empirical research entity for the social scientific study of law. We thank B.G. for his quiet and effective service and all of us in The Fellows owe him a great deal of gratitude. We are fortunate to have as an incoming Director, Robert L. Nelson, who is more than familiar with the Foundation, having served as an ABF Research Fellow for more than 20 years. The excellence of his scholarship on the legal profession is widely recognized. He is a warm and wonderful person, dedicated to the cause of The Fellows, who will carry the Foundation and its research to new heights. It is an exciting time for the Foundation, and we extend our heartfelt gratitude to B.G. and a most hearty welcome to Bob Nelson.

A New Business Meeting Format

At the Annual Meeting of the American Bar Association in San Francisco on Sunday, August 8, 2003, we experimented with a Breakfast Meeting of The Fellows, which was a resounding success. Our featured speaker was James J. Brosnahan, Jr., who spoke about his representation of John Walker Lindh. His presentation kept us all spellbound, and we all left with great admiration for his dedication to the highest calling of the profession, his integrity, and the manner in which he handled that representation. We have decided to continue with that tradition. Accordingly, on August 6, the Annual Breakfast Meeting of the members in Atlanta will include a speaker of similar reputation. We look forward to seeing you in Atlanta on August 6 for this ongoing event.

Success of San Antonio

I want to take this opportunity to thank our excellent staff for the work that was done to put on one of the best Annual Meetings that The Fellows has ever had that occurred in San Antonio. The staff included Joanne Martin, Associate Director of the Foundation, Laura Curley, Director of The Fellows, Sommer Lohrentz, Coordinator for The Fellows. I also want to thank Lauren Uritus of the Meetings and Travel Department of the American Bar Association, who is principal coordinator for the venues and events. Through their efforts each of the events was, by all accounts, very successful and enjoyable. I also want to thank and make special mention of Karen Kleinmaier, who has been one of the most productive and helpful staff members of The Fellows for many years, and who has been recently blessed with a beautiful set of twin boys, Cooper Reid and Owen West. Unfortunately, Karen will only be able to assist us in the future on a part-time basis, but we wish her well in her great new undertaking.

Whittenbury** organized a program based around a presentation by ABF Director **Bryant G. Garth** of data from a national study of the evolution of young lawyers’ careers. The program qualified for one hour of Bias in the Legal Profession CLE credit.

Kudos also to State Chair **Roderick B. Mathews** for his efforts in invigorating the Fellows program in Virginia. 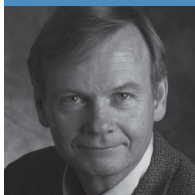

I am excited about becoming the Director of the American Bar Foundation this coming September and very

here and internationally—to name just a few projects—ABF scholars are doing significant empirical research in these critical areas.

Not only do the Fellows contribute financially through their annual giving and major gifts to the ABF, but it is very important and very valuable that the Fellows—a group recognized as leaders in the profession—understand and promote the need for the research done by the ABF. Over the course of my research career at the ABF, I have learned enormously from working with and discussing research with Fellows. As Director I hope to further strengthen the relationship between the Fellows and the ABF research program, by continuing our regular series of Fellows' Seminars at the mid-year meetings and our Fellows Advisory Research Committee, as well as through talks by research fellows at state and local Fellows' meetings and other outreach efforts. I want to express my thanks to Steve Walther, Jim Silkenat, and Richard Pena for all their hard work in trying to expand the Fellows and make it a more vibrant professional community. As we look to the years ahead, the success of the Fellows is critical to the success of the ABF. I look forward to working with all of you to build an even stronger Fellows group and a more robust program of research on the law.

Bylaw Amendments

Several amendments to The Fellows bylaws were recently approved by The Fellows at the Business Breakfast Meeting in San Antonio and by the Board of Directors of the American Bar Foundation in May. Henceforth, the term “lawyer population” for purposes of determining state quotas will exclude inactive lawyers and lawyers who are admitted *pro hac vic*. (Section 3.02.A.2.) A change in the definition of Fellows-at-Large provides a mechanism for Fellows who move to other states to become affiliated with the Fellows programs in their “new” state. Additionally, an amendment to the selection procedure for Fellows-at-Large permits The Fellows officers and members of the ABF Board to identify qualified lawyers who might be eligible for election to The Fellows. (Section 3.02.B.1. and Section 4.03.A. and D.) An Executive Council composed of the three Fellows Officers and the three Regional Chairs was created to broaden the governance responsibility. (Section 7.02.) Finally, the Fellows operating year and terms of service for officers have been changed to mirror those of the ABF and the ABA. The Annual Business Meeting will now be held in conjunction with the ABA’s Annual Meeting and the terms of the officers shall begin on September 1 and conclude on August 31 of the following calendar year.
