### **RESEARCH EXPERIENCE**

- 2024 **Applied Research Laboratory for Intelligence and Security, University of Maryland:** I participated in a 10-week summer program, Research for Intelligence and Security Community, which involved engaging with a broad community of practice-based scholars, and working closely with two colleagues to conduct a collaborative literature review on the sociocultural dynamics of “wargaming.” Our final product was a 40-page analysis of the current state of the literature.
- 2021 – 2022 **Quito, Ecuador / Champaign, Illinois:** 12 months of ethnographic doctoral research involving in-person participant observation, in-person and remote interviews, archival research, and digital communication with Colombian refugees, NGO workers, and government bureaucrats based in Quito, Ecuador. The question that guided this research is how refugees experience and navigate violence, persecution, and displacement in spaces and at times of supposed peace and refuge in the Global South.
